SEL or Social & Emotional Learning, as defined by CASEL (Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning), is an integral part of education and human development.


SEL is the process through which all young people and adults acquire and apply knowledge, skills and attitudes to develop healthy identities, manage emotions and achieve personal and collective goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain supportive relationships, and make responsible and caring decisions (CASEL). At Reins students are working with their equine-partners, not only building horsemanship skills but practical skills for living and leading healthy lives.

#### A MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

#### Reaching goals with us = hard work and fun!

There is one unifying quality across various aspects of our organization - challenges are met with a smile and the determination to succeed.

Every day at Reins brings an array of new experiences and achievements. Behind all of the successes and milestones are hours of hard work and endless dedication and determination of many contributors. I am sure that many of you have wondered whether we measure progress, collect data, and if so how. Let's take our oldest program Therapeutic Horseback Riding under the microscope. At the initial meeting (New Rider Evaluation) recommendations for prospective rider are made; for appropriate class placement, suitable horse from which rider will derive the most benefits (gaited/not gaited; bouncy/less bouncy, wide/narrow; tall/short; calm/energetic), required assistance (one side-walker or two side-walkers; talkative/quiet), need of special accommodations or specialized adaptive equipment, type of class (group, semi-private or private lessons), type of support (full support, ankle hold or thigh hold). Once an applicant is accepted into the program, goals are set based on the input from parents and/or riders themselves, teachers and medical professionals. Progress is documented in one or all categories: social, cognitive, physical, behavioral and riding. Each rider is then evaluated with a written summary at the conclusion of each session. When needed, goals are adjusted and redefined. In a year we have 5 sessions (Winter, Spring, Summer, Fall and Holiday). Goals are set and evaluated each session. Each session we challenge riders to do more to reach their highest level of independence. Through Progress Notes we can see if the designed approach matches the needs of the rider and decide whether adjustments are needed. Typically, a rider will have 3-4 goals set per session and on average will meet at least 2-3. For us 2021 marked an incredible year (see chart). We set collectively over 800 goals of which 70% were met. Together WE STRIDE!
